Who was the first man in space?

Cassopolis residents are likely to say it was Iven Kincheloe Jr., a Cassopolis native who in 1956 set a new altitude record when he flew a research plane 126,200 feet — nearly 24 miles — above the Earth. Kincheloe was quoted as saying that a the peak of his Bell X-2 research plane's trajectory, he was weightless...

"At the time, he was declared the first spaceman. It was a big deal," recalled Steve Arseneau, director of the Southwesterr Michigan College Museum in Dowagiac.

So it was something of a surprise recently when news accounts of the death in Orlando, Fla., of Robert White, 85, identifie him as the first man to fly a winged craft into space.
